
## **PREPARATION FOR U3A CITY WALK – AUGUST 2022**





## JOLIMONT

Charles La Trobe was 1<sup>st</sup> Superintendent of Port Phillip Colony 1839-1851, and 1<sup>st</sup> Lieutenant – Governor of Victoria 1851-1854. La Trobe purchased land in 1839, on the fringe of the city which he named Jolimont, and erected his home which he had transported in sections from London. Relocated from Jolimont in the 1960s, it is now restored and preserved as La Trobe's Cottage, in the Domain. CBD La Trobe St. and La Trobe University, are just 2 locations named in his honour.
