### Online Course Enrolment Using MyU3A

- Go to Member Log-In and use your ID number and password to access your Profile Page. Scroll down the page, press 'Classes 2022', then scroll down that page to press 'Classes 2022' again. This will open the page where you can enrol.
- For all courses/classes/events, select the courses that you wish to attend, at the bottom of the page select "Next" and your 'Class Status' will be shown (i.e., if you have a place or if you are wait-listed).
- At the bottom of the page select "Next" again and your course enrolments will be confirmed. This will return you to your Member Summary page indicating your enrolments. To print a copy of this page, go to the bottom of the page and select "Print".
- When you are finished press Exit.

<b>Weekly</b>		The aim of this self-directed study group is to think philosophically. It is not about sharing opinions, but a certain way of thinking about questions and concepts that is disciplined and rigorous. We welcome new members to join us in this activity. In Semester 1, 2022 the text will be John Stuart Mill's, 'On Liberty'. J S Mill was a 19th century political philosopher. He had a Utilitarian background, was a proto-feminist, empiricist and wrote the classic book 'On Liberty'. While many of his predecessors and contemporaries, from Adam Smith to Godwin and Thoreau, had celebrated liberty, it was Mill who organised the idea into a philosophy, and put it into the form in which it is generally known today. It is essential that students have a copy of the book. The recommended edition is Penguin Classics published in 1982. <b>1 Session</b>	The presenter, Valentino (Tino) Vescovi graduated with an MSc (Electronics) from the University of Melbourne in 1965. His professional career took him to Fairchild, California where, in 1970, he joined Intel and was soon after responsible for designing the world's first microprocessor, the Intel Z4004. This lecture by Tino will introduce you to some of the early innovators who made critical breakthroughs that eventually resulted in the computer technology that we take for granted today. It all started in 1949 with the first Germanium transistor, followed in 1954 by the more useful Silicon transistor. Then in 1958 Jack Kilby at Texas Instruments attempted the first integrated circuit, improved a few years later by Jean Hoerni and Robert Noyce at the recently founded Fairchild Semiconductor Co. Rapid progress in the IC technology in the mid-60s eventually led to the first microprocessor, released in 1971, which then enabled the rapid development of digitally-based devices such as lap-top computers, tablets and smart phones that most of us enjoy using today.

<b>1 Session</b>	Lorayne is the great granddaughter of the Australian inventor Henry Sutton. In 2008 Lorayne began researching Henry which led her to write his biography to record for the first time his important contribution to Australian and world innovation history. Very few people have crossed as many scientific fields as Henry Sutton. By age 26 Henry had won world acclaim and stood as an equal alongside such men as Alexander Graham Bell, Nikola Tesla and Thomas Edison.				

	Although applauded around the world in his day for his remarkable achievements, Henry Sutton went largely unnoticed in Australia by his peers and the public. His life's work spanned all avenues of science and engineering and helped shape the technology of the world today. Henry Sutton stands alone in world history as one of Australia's first true men of science and innovation.

It once had the world's most productive phosphate mine but today is almost uninhabitable, its people enslaved and later exiled to Rambi, an island in Fiji - a little known community of victims of colonisation and war.

He was resident conductor of the Australian Ballet, Music Director of two Grammar Schools and of several community choirs. He was the Artistic Director and Conductor of the Melbourne Youth Orchestra for 15 years. This lecture will introduce the parts of the conducting process commencing with the role of the conductor generally, then moving through to beat patterns, score preparation and marking, balancing the group, interpretation, rehearsal technique and concert roles. We will also spend time on what a conductor should not do, how to avoid difficult situations in rehearsals, and how to prepare a work when there is no recording available. He became aware of attempts of Government to interfere with the independence of the ABC and even politicians who wanted to see it sold off and privatised. This led him to join ABC Friends Victoria. The ABC is important to Australia for a host of reasons. A national broadcaster that is free of commercial and political influence plays a vital role in our democracy. It holds the government of the day to be accountable and transparent. It represents “the people” in relation to the business and political elites who claim to be doing things in our name. The ABC is bound by a charter that requires it to provide programs of the highest standard that promotes Australian culture. It provides employment to Australian professionals who are engaged in making homegrown programs, as well as vital emergency broadcasts during the bushfire season and other natural disasters.

<b>1 Session</b>	<p>Valentino (Tino) Vescovi graduated with an MSc (Electronics) from the University of Melbourne in 1965. Most of his professional life has been in electronics R&amp;D with an emphasis on power conversion.</p> <p>You have solar panels and are thinking of buying an electric car. This lecture by Tino will discuss some relevant issues: The over-rated “Range Anxiety”. Trickle charging your electric car from the grid. Trickle charging from your solar panels. Charging from your home battery. Joining a recharging network for charging during long journeys.</p> <p>We will also discuss how EVs can play a part in easing the transition to a Green Energy future by the use of Vehicle-to-Grid (V2G) technology.</p> <p>With an EV and a V2G unit you can charge the EV battery during the day at very cheap rates and return some of the EV battery energy back into the grid during the evening peak, at much higher rates, so reducing power bills, while helping the power companies meet the evening peak power demand.</p>

<b>1 Session</b>	<p>Steph is a Melbourne-born social entrepreneur and Rotary Foundation Peace Scholar who has created the international aid organisation Seven Women, tour company Hands On Development and the International Training and Hospitality initiative. Stephanie started her Seven Women project when she was only 22 years old, after visiting Nepal and meeting seven disabled women making soaps and candles in a small tin shed. In Nepal, disabilities carry a strong social stigma, believed to bring bad fortune. The women were consequently able to sell only a fraction of what they produced at market and lived in dire poverty.</p> <p>Disturbed by the injustice and isolation these women were facing, she spent her last \$200 of travel money to pay two trainers to help up-skill the women and sell their products abroad. Since then, Steph has devoted the past decade to changing the lives of disabled and marginalised women in Nepal. Hear the story of Seven Women and how Steph went from a tin shed to the United Nations. This talk from Steph will be a fund-raising event to support the Seven Sisters education and employment empowerment initiative in Nepal. Attendees' donation of \$5 or \$10 will go towards the sponsorship of at least one child to go to school for one year (approx \$250 per child). U3A Banyule can help to make a difference. 
