- At the bottom of the page select "Next" again and your course enrolments will be confirmed. This will return you to your Member Summary page indicating your enrolments. To print a copy of this page, go to the bottom of the page and select "Print".
- When you are finished press Exit.

You will receive a confirmation email for each course that you are enrolled in.

She has worked primarily in the Asia-Pacific region, including South Korea, Singapore, Cambodia, the Philippines and Bangladesh. She believes strongly in finding mediums through which the voices of victims and survivors of modern-day slavery can be heard. The lecture will focus on the precarious situation of migrant workers and human trafficking drawing on the situation in Australia and current projects on the links between climate change and vulnerable labour migration in the Asia Pacific region.

1 Session	Patricia Burke, as the State Manager for Philanthropy Australia's Victoria and Tasmania members, has been part of Australia's peak body for philanthropy and giving since 2011. In 2020 Pat was awarded a Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) for service to the community through charitable organisations. As a giving circle advocate, Pat is Co-Founder of the Melbourne Women's Fund, which was established in 2014 to support women and families in metropolitan Melbourne. Charities depend upon three primary income sources to deliver their vital services: government, giving & philanthropy, and other income/revenue. Approximately 1 in 4 charities depend on giving and philanthropy for at least half of their total revenue. Smaller charities tend to depend on giving and philanthropy for a higher proportion of their income. This session will explore the state of philanthropy in Australia, the history and legacy, current trends and opportunities for individuals to participate, and the importance of growing a culture of giving in Australia.

1 Session	Jim's forebears first settled in the Yarra Valley in 1840 and forged enduring Aboriginal relationships. Jim has therefore been privy to the oral history of Aboriginal families as well as that of his own. His ongoing research and writing has therefore been informed by a unique understanding of the Aboriginal mindset and traditional culture. Jim's talk will challenge what many of us were taught in				

	relation to arrival of the First Fleet. For example, that the Aborigines were nomads, endlessly moving in search of food. New evidence now shows that Aboriginal people across Australia were 'permaculture farmers' rather than simple 'hunter-gatherers'. Cereal and root crops were grown in designated areas, grain was stored, thinly treed grazing areas were carefully managed and meat was smoked for storage and trade. River courses were also closely managed as a series of fish and eel traps, as well as yabbie and freshwater mussel farms.

1 Session	Janette Etherington has worked for Interplast since Sept. 2019. She has worked in both the commercial and not-for-profit worlds, before moving into the charity space, when she commenced at Interplast. Interplast traditionally provides free plastic and reconstructive surgeries to people in desperate need across the Asia-Pacific. These surgeries would not otherwise be available due to under-resourced health systems, or the patients lacking the resources to travel to, or pay for, hospital care. Interplast's volunteers provide treatment for congenital defects such as cleft lips and palates, traumatic injuries and burns, removal of disfiguring and disabling tumours. Interplast also trains and mentors health care professionals to develop capacity to treat the next generation of patients. During the global pandemic our work has continued, even though Interplast can't send our volunteers overseas.

He has worked out of publications in Melbourne, Sydney, London and Canberra. He has covered hard news, crime, sport, politics, rural, and human-interest stories. He has won the Australian Press Photographer of the Year Award and the Eltham Arts Council Award for Outstanding Service to the Arts. The National Portrait Gallery in Canberra has acquired nine of Bill's portraits for their collections. Bill will present a slideshow of fifty famous faces he has photographed during his career. The images were usually taken with the subject's permission and gave him the pleasure of meeting many world-famous celebrities! Other images are candid or taken during the artist's performance. His subjects include rock stars, Hollywood actors, politicians, and gold medal winning sportspeople. He has trained his lens on Meryl Streep, Gough Whitlam, Cathy Freeman, Paul McCartney, Michael Jackson, Carl Lewis, Barry Humphries, Eric Bana, Molly Meldrum, Sigrid Thornton, the Dalai Lama, and many others. 1 Session	Lorayne is the great granddaughter of the Australian inventor Henry Sutton. In 2008 I began researching Henry which led me to write his biography to record for the first time his important contribution to Australian and world innovation history. Very few people have crossed as many scientific fields as Henry Sutton. By age 26 Henry had won world acclaim and stood as an equal alongside such men as Alexander Graham Bell, Nikola Tesla and Thomas Edison. Although applauded around the world in his day for his remarkable achievements, Henry Sutton went largely unnoticed in Australia by his peers and the public. His life's work spanned all avenues of science and engineering and helped shape the technology of the world today. Henry Sutton stands alone in world history as one of Australia's first true men of science and innovation.

1 Session	Dr Lisa Beaven is Adjunct Senior Research Fellow at La Trobe University, and a Research Associate of the School of Culture and Communication at the University of Melbourne. She has published widely in the area of art patronage, collecting and material culture in Italy in the seventeenth-century, and her research interests extend to early modern travel and digital mapping. Dr Beaven's lecture explores the sensibility that Grand Tourists brought to the experience of viewing ancient statues, and the emotional responsiveness that emerged in this encounter. The vogue for looking at various sites and statues by moonlight and torchlight clearly reveals that many wanted to engage their imagination as well as their sight in their encounter with antiquity. Drawing on travel writing and travel accounts, the lecture reconstructs the eighteenth-century Roman context for this viewing experience.

1 Session	Dr Baka's (BPE, BA, MA, Ph.D.) main area of research is related to the Olympic movement, especially Australia at the Olympics. Beginning with its successful hosting of the 1956 Olympics labelled the "Friendly Games", Melbourne went on to develop a vibrant and unique Olympic legacy. This included developing world-class sports facilities in the Olympic Park precinct and other locations. The Melbourne Cricket Ground serves as the focal point of a rich Olympic legacy. The city also created strong Olympic connections via such concepts as the National Sports Museum, the Olympic Winter Institute of Australia, the Victorian Olympic Council and the Victorian Institute of Sport. Melbourne earned itself the title of Australia's sporting capital by way of not only developing an extensive infrastructure but its hosting of major sporting events (e.g. AFL Grand Final, the Australian Tennis Open, etc.). It has also had a major contribution by way of many local athletes and sport administrators advancing the cause of Olympism.

Dvořák was a Czech nationalist whose early works used rhythms of Bohemian and Moravian folk music. He was a prolific composer with broad interests, writing concerti, symphonies, songs, quintets, quartets, choral works and symphonic poems. He travelled widely through Europe, and had a highly successful trip to America, where he wrote his most popular orchestral works, the 9th Symphony "From the New World" and the Cello Concerto. The Americans loved the symphony so much that Neil Armstrong took a copy to the moon!

Mendelssohn's father converted the family from Judaism to Christianity. Despite this, and particularly since his premature death, Felix Mendelssohn has been haunted by his Jewish connections, to the extent that his music was banned from Hitler's 3rd Reich. This child prodigy deserves greater recognition than he has received, as much of his mostly forgotten music will demonstrate.

1 Session	Jordan's work focuses on Victorian National Parks Association (VNPA) campaigns to protect and care for our wildlife and wild places. Jordan's background in conservation work ranges from the ocean to the tall forest of the Central Highlands, and he has worked with all levels of government to get results for the natural world for many years. The 2019/20 bushfires burnt 1.3 million hectares in eastern Victoria, killing millions of animals. The talk will explore the immediate impact on our flora and fauna, as well the ongoing risks of extinction. The report After the fires analyses the impacts of the 2019/20 Black Summer bushfires on select species and reveals that significant areas of unburnt forests critical for bushfire-affected wildlife are under imminent threat from logging.
