LIFE MEMBERSHIP AWARDED TO JANICE KELLY

There was enthusiastic acclamation from members attending the U3A Banyule Annual General Meeting on 16 August when Life Membership was presented to Janice Kelly.

Life Membership is bestowed on members who have made an extraordinary contribution towards the advancement of U3A Banyule, demonstrating outstanding qualities of leadership and innovation.

Presenting a framed certificate of Life Membership, Helen McKinnon spoke about Janice's many achievements during her time as President from 2012 to 2016.

She was an outstanding leader and manager leading a period of strong membership growth whereby U3A Banyule became the largest seniors' organisation in Banyule.

A highlight was her project management of the introduction of the computerised online management system, MyU3A.



Particularly memorable was the way Janice spearheaded the campaign to retain the Senior Citizens' Hall as premises for the U3A Office and Hall in 2015 when Banyule Council was contemplating the sale of the building. She is now the Committee's liaison person with Council for the Ivanhoe Library and Cultural Hub which will provide dedicated space for a new U3A office and meeting areas.

The 30th Year Anniversary of U3A Banyule in 2016 was marked by a splendid celebratory event held in the Ivanhoe Centre. Janice chaired the planning committee for this successful occasion. She also made a great contribution to strengthening links with the wider community through her negotiation of a three-year Memorandum of Understanding with La Trobe University, joint programs with a number of organisations and the redesign of the U3A Banyule website.

In addition to her role as President, Janice has been a Tutor since 2010, leading a weekly two-hour class in Philosophy.

In 2016 Janice was recognised by the community when she became a joint recipient of the Banyule Individual Volunteer Award. Life Membership of U3A Banyule is a further acknowledgement of her outstanding contribution to the community and her commitment to lifelong learning.

U3A NETWORK VICTORIA report by Helen McKinnon

U3A Banyule is one of 109 U3As in Victoria with a total membership of over 38,000. Australia-wide there are approximately 300 U3As with about 100,000 members. U3A Network Victoria is the peak body of the U3A Movement in Victoria. Its purpose is to maximise the benefits of mental and physical stimulation, quality learning and social inclusion for all seniors.

The U3A Network coordinates activities, develops policies, provides education and training, represents the Movement to external interests and government and seeks and administers funds on behalf of member U3As. It promotes the establishment of new U3As, and membership growth in existing ones, and acts as a mentor and adviser to member U3As.

The Network Victoria Committee has 11 members who volunteer their time, supported by three paid staff. U3A Banyule member and former President, Janice Kelly, is a member of the Committee; her role is marketing and promotion. The Network Members' Council meets quarterly. There is also a regional meeting structure with 6 metropolitan and 6 rural regions. Regular meetings of the regional groups provide opportunities for training and sharing of success stories, problems and solutions.

Common key issues of concern are marketing, engaging diverse members of the community, policies, IT advice and relationship building. Network Victoria is developing a Strategic Plan to compete more successfully for government funding so as to be able to better respond to the needs of member U3As and strengthen advocacy.

2019 ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP FEES

\$45 for a full-year membership (\$30 if joining for Semester 2 after 1 June).

\$25 for an associate membership (no half year rate). An associate member must currently be a full member of another U3A and able to show proof of the membership before being eligible to attend one or more U3A Banyule courses.

Membership fees can be paid online via Member Log-in through the [U3A Banyule website](#) or in the office.

MyU3A is an online membership and course enrolment system accessed from our website where members can:

ONLINE MEMBERSHIP RENEWAL USING MYU3A OPEN FROM 5 NOVEMBER 2018

1. Go to www.u3abanyule.org.au
2. Click on Member Log-In (top right of Home page)
3. Enter your ID number and password.
4. Check that your personal details, occupation (prior to retirement), skills and emergency contacts are up to date, scroll down and press **Commit**.
5. Scroll down the next page (Membership Status 2019), and press **Next**.
6. On Member Summary 2019 page, scroll down and follow the prompts for payment (through the U3A Banyule PayPal account), with your credit card. Note: It is not necessary to have a personal PayPal account and there are no additional fees. **Once paid, scroll down the PayPal confirmation page and click on "Return to Sellers Website". Your Membership Status page will now indicate 2019**

NEW MEMBERS JOINING ONLINE USING MYU3A

1. Go to www.u3abanyule.org.au
2. Select Membership page, scroll to New Members and select 'Join Us', which links to MyU3A.
3. Follow the prompts to provide your personal details, including emergency contact details, pay online and to receive an ID and password. When using the PayPal option, remember to scroll down the PayPal confirmation of payment page to "**Return to Seller's Website**".
4. **After payment is completed, return to your Membership Status page to check your payment has been processed.**

MEMBERSHIP RENEWAL OR JOINING VIA THE OFFICE OR BY MAIL

Please complete a membership form and pay by cash or by cheque, either:

1. In person through the office (Monday – Friday between 10am - 12noon);
2. Or by mail to U3A Banyule Inc, PO Box 454, Rosanna 3084.

NOTE TO NEW MEMBERS: All new members receive a Welcome Pack, containing further information about U3A Banyule, a name badge and lanyard, a recent newsletter and an invitation to attend the next New Member Welcome and Orientation morning tea.

IMPORTANT NOTE RELATING TO EXCURSIONS/EVENTS THAT REQUIRE PRIOR PAYMENT

Previously members could enrol for excursions/events and pay by a due date. This system was cumbersome and difficult to administer for the Tutors and Office Volunteers. Members are now asked to Enrol and Pay at the same time for an excursion/event where a prior payment is required. **Do not enrol first in multiple excursions/events and pay as a total amount - please pay for each individual excursion/event as you enrol in each one.**

To facilitate this process, online payment via MyU3A is now offered for the relevant excursions/events where prior payment is required. Payment by cash and cheque in the office and bank transfer is still accepted, however online payment is quicker and easier for members and our volunteers.

COURSE ENROLMENT FOR SEMESTER 1, 2019 OPENS 3 DECEMBER 2018

The Semester 1, 2019 Program is available to view online from **19 November 2018** on our website (see Courses, then Course Information, then 2019 Program) and is included in this newsletter. Only **financial members** will be able to enrol when course enrolment opens on **Monday 3 December 2018**.

Procedure for Enrolment

1. **Online Course Enrolment Using MyU3A**
 - Member Log-In using your ID number and password, scroll down the page, press 'Classes 2019', then scroll down that page to press 'Classes 2019' again, to the page where you can enrol.
 - **For excursion/event where prior payment is required (Enrol and Pay Excursion/Event)**, enrol and pay for one excursion/event at a time.
 - **For all other courses, where prior payment is not required:** Select your courses that you wish to attend, select Next (bottom of the page) and your 'Class Status' will be shown (ie if you have a place or if you are wait listed).

- Again, select Next (bottom of screen) and your course enrolments are confirmed. You will have returned to your Member Summary page indicating your enrolments. To print a copy of this select Print (bottom of screen).
- When finished press Exit.
- You will receive a confirmation email for each course that you are enrolled in.

Note: Waitlisted members are accepted into a course in the order in which they enrolled. When a place becomes available you will be sent a confirmation email.

2. Course Enrolment Through the Office

Complete a **My Enrolment Form** and **hand deliver to the office or mail it** (include a stamped self-addressed envelope). For Enrol and Pay Excursions/Events that require payment at the same time, include the relevant payment (see pages 30 - 33).

Note: there are extended office hours for course enrolment, on Monday 3 December, Tuesday 4 December and Monday 14 January, 9.00am – 1.00pm, in the U3A Hall.

Forms will be processed in the order received. Forms posted into the office will not be processed prior to 3 December. Committee members and other volunteers will be present in the office to enter the course enrolment requests on MyU3A. The form will be signed and dated and returned to you either on the day or mailed.

3. Payment Options for Excursions/Events are:

- **Preferred Method: Online, via Member Log-In**, through the U3A Banyule PayPal account, with your credit card. Note: It is not necessary to have a personal PayPal account and there are no additional fees. **Once paid, scroll down the PayPal confirmation page and click on “Return to Sellers Website”.** **Your Membership Status page will now indicate 2019**

LA TROBE UNIVERSITY – ATTENDANCE AT LECTURES

La Trobe University offers members of U3A Banyule the opportunity to sit in, as audit (ie listening) students, on some of the lectures. They cannot attend tutorials or practicals, nor can they receive assessments. For those who need library access, the university will issue students with a library card. Subjects are selected from the La Trobe University website, <http://www.latrobe.edu.au/courses/a-z> using "Browse all courses".

The number of subjects you can study is limited to one per semester. U3A Banyule member participation is for courses offering face-to-face lectures, but at this stage not for online or blended learning courses. (Note that specialist training may fall under the blended learning category or practical categories and many business courses are now online)

We ask you to select 2 or 3 course preferences as your first preference may be unavailable. Please state your availability on days and times or state that you are flexible with your availability

ENROL AND PAY EXCURSIONS/EVENTS - enrolment and payment at the same time

Following the successful trial of online payment for one event in 2018 we are pleased to offer online payment for all Excursions/Events where prior payment is required (**see pages 30 – 32**). Online payment via MyU3A is a time saver for members and it reduces the onerous work of Office Volunteers, the finance team and Tutors. **It is the preferred method of payment.** Please give it a go and if you have any problems, contact the Support Team on info@u3abanyule.org.au.

When members enrol in an excursion/event requiring prior payment, **Class Fees** will appear on their Member Status page in MyU3A. It will show an outstanding balance. **Once payment has been made, using the PayPal option (either the U3A Banyule PayPal account, member's own PayPal account, or credit card) a receipt number and date of payment will be indicated on the Member Status page and the balance will reduce to zero.**

Payment needs to be made for one excursion/event at a time, prior to enrolling in another excursion/event.

Note: when paying Class Fees online, you will see a request to “Initiate payment for fees for 2019 Membership” and “You are paying \$ (amount) for 2019 membership. We cannot change the wording at this stage – but continue with your payment, which will be applied to the relevant excursion/event. In the future, we hope to be able to match the wording to the actual payment being made.

Members can also pay in the office, using cash or cheque or by bank transfer (**remember to add a reference of your surname and course code**). However, you can only enrol in one excursion/event and pay for that one, before enrolling and paying in another one. Once payment has been received by U3A Banyule, it will need to be applied manually to your MyU3A record, in order for your MyU3A balance to become zero.

The following policy has been developed to assist in the smooth and fair running of excursions/events.

Enrol and Pay Excursions/Events Policy

1. Only members who have enrolled and paid will be able to attend excursions/events.
2. Online payment via MyU3A (Member Log-In) is now available for excursions/events which require prior payment. **It is the preferred method of payment.**
3. Payment is also accepted by bank transfer and in the office (cash/cheque) and it will need to be recorded manually on the member's MyU3A record by the finance team.
4. **For specified Enrol and Pay Excursions/Events, enrolment and payment must occur at the same time (see pages 30 – 32).** Members should not enrol for any other Enrol and Pay Excursion/event until payment has been made for the first excursion/event and their MyU3A balance is zero.
5. Where a fee is not specified initially for an Enrol and Pay Excursion/Event, this fee will be advised to members, 6 weeks prior to the date of the excursion/event and enrolments will open at this time. The policy of Enrol and Pay at the same time will apply.
6. When you have enrolled, a confirmation email will be generated by MyU3A.
7. A closing date for enrolment is specified for all excursions/events.
8. For those members who have enrolled and are on the waiting list, **payment is not required, until a place has been offered.**
