Warm greetings to all the members of the U3A Banyule learning community! This Newsletter brings information about the new and ongoing courses, single sessions, excursions and other events that are on offer for our participation in Semester 2. We are very appreciative of the work done by our Course Coordinator, Joan Learmont, and her team to make all this possible. I am sure you will be excited by the scope of the program.

There are some great new courses designed to appeal to the wide and varied interests of our members— for example, science topics such as Climate Change and Renewable Energy (436 – 01); the Earth Watch Project (418 – 01); a Science Study Group (444 – 01); Astronomy and Cosmology (451 – 01). Fish and Fishing (450 – 01) might also be a draw card.

Check out the Public Lectures of the 4th Monday of each month – the range of topics is tantalising. If travel is your thing, don't miss Julie Marshall's talk on Brazil (420 – 01). Our popular history presenter, Jane Davies, is back with four series of 5 sessions each on a range of fascinating topics. Amongst several opportunities for physical activity is a new line dancing class (458 – 01). Enrol and pay events are grouped together at the end of the list, and include the much-loved art excursions, and tastings of wine, gin, whisky and big reds. Our annual Forum is to be held on 25 November, in an exciting new venue, on the topic of Social Media. Don't miss this important enrol and pay event! There is much, much more - truly, something for everyone!

Looking back, I want to congratulate the 23 U3A Banyule members who participated in the Premier's Active April. They logged a combined total of 676 hours and 24 minutes, by walking (almost 50%), gardening, gym, cycling and Tai Chi. They reported that it was fun, and very motivational. Thanks to Cheryl Pritchard, who co-ordinated our involvement.

Another recent event was a very enjoyable and successful fundraising afternoon tea for the Pancare Foundation. Almost 50 members came together for this occasion, and raised a total of \$780, of which \$340 came from the sale of items made by the Creative Knitting group. The Pancare Foundation is Australia's only charity providing awareness, research and support for those affected by pancreatic and upper gastrointestinal cancers. It was heart-warming to have the opportunity to support this very important work.

In conclusion, I want to thank all the people who continue to help U3A Banyule to thrive – Committee members, Tutors and facilitators, office volunteers, those who lend a hand in various ways at classes, and every member who embraces learning experiences and social opportunities with excitement, energy and enthusiasm. May you enjoy semester 2 to the maximum!

Ivanhoe Library and Cultural Hub - Construction Has Started!

Banyule councillors and Anthony Carbines MP launched the start of construction of this \$29 million, community facility. A special sod-turning event was held on Sunday 3 March with several U3A Banyule members in attendance. The state-of-the-art facility will offer a modern library, meeting rooms and office for U3A Banyule's use, an art gallery, a café and more.

The project is expected to be complete by August 2020 and U3A Banyule will be moving as soon as practical after completion.

1. Go to www.u3abanyule.org.au
2. Select Membership page, scroll to New Members and select '**Join Us**', which links to MyU3A.
3. Follow the prompts to provide your personal details, including emergency contact details and to pay online. When using the PayPal option, remember to scroll down the PayPal confirmation of payment page to "**Return to Seller's Website**".
4. **After payment is completed, return to your Membership Status page to check your payment has been processed.**

COURSE ENROLMENT FOR SEMESTER 2, 2019

The Semester 2, 2019 Program is available to preview online from **Monday 3 June** on our website (see Courses, then Course Information) and is included in this newsletter.

Course enrolment opens Monday 17 June.

Note: Enrolment is only required for new courses. You do not have to re-enrol for on-going courses.

Procedure for Enrolment

1. Online Course Enrolment Using MyU3A

- Member Log-In using your ID number and password, scroll down the page, press **'Classes 2019'**, then scroll down that page to press **'Classes 2019'** again, to the page where you can enrol.
- **For excursion/event where prior payment is required (Enrol and Pay Excursion/Event)**, enrol and pay for one excursion/event at a time.
- **For all other courses, where prior payment is not required:** Select your courses that you wish to attend, select **Next** (bottom of the page) and your **'Class Status'** will be shown (ie if you have a place or if you are wait listed).
- Again, select **Next** (bottom of screen) and your course enrolments are confirmed. You will have returned to your Member Summary page indicating your enrolments. To print a copy of this, select **Print** (bottom of screen).
- When finished press **Exit**.
- You will receive a confirmation email for each course that you are enrolled in.

Note: Waitlisted members are accepted into a course in the order in which they enrolled. When a place becomes available you will be sent a confirmation email.

2. Course Enrolment Through the Office

Complete a **My Enrolment Form** and **hand deliver to the office or mail it** (include a stamped self-addressed envelope). For Enrol and Pay Excursions/Events that require payment at the same time, include the relevant payment (see pages 29-32).

Note: there are extended office hours for course enrolment, on Monday 17 June, 9.00am – 2.00pm, in the U3A Hall.

Forms will be processed in the order received. Forms posted into the office will not be processed prior to 17 June. Committee members and other volunteers will be present in the office to enter the course enrolment requests on MyU3A. The form will be signed and dated and returned to you either on the day or mailed.

ENROL AND PAY EXCURSIONS/EVENTS

Some excursions and events require payment at the time of enrolment and are referred to as Enrol and Pay Excursions/Events. **Please do not enrol first in multiple excursions/events and pay as a total amount - pay for each individual excursion/event as you enrol in each one.**

To facilitate this process, online payment via MyU3A is available for the relevant excursions/events where prior payment is required. **Refer to page 7 for Payment Options.**

Payment by cash and cheque in the office and bank transfer are still accepted, however online payment is quicker and easier for members and our volunteers.

Please refer to pages 29-32 for all 'Enrol and Pay Excursions/Events' that require enrolment and payment at the same time.

U3A BANYULE PAYMENT OPTIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP FEES AND EXCURSIONS/EVENTS

- **Preferred Method: Online, via Member Log-In**, through the U3A Banyule PayPal account, with your credit card. Note: It is not necessary to have a personal PayPal account and there are no additional fees. **IMPORTANT: Once paid, scroll down the PayPal confirmation page and click on “Return to Sellers Website”.**

Note: when paying Excursion/Event Fees online, you will see a request to “Initiate payment for fees for **2019 Membership**” and “You are paying \$(amount) for **2019 membership**. We cannot change the wording at this stage – but continue with your payment, which will be applied to the relevant excursion/event. In the future, we hope to be able to match the wording to the actual payment being made.

LA TROBE UNIVERSITY – ATTENDANCE AT LECTURES

La Trobe University offers full members of U3A Banyule the opportunity to sit in, as audit (i.e. listening) students, on some of the lectures. This offer does not include attendance at tutorials or practicals, nor will participants receive assessments on their learning. For those who want library access, the university may be able to issue students with a library card.

Subjects are selected from the La Trobe University website www.latrobe.edu.au/courses/a-z, using “Browse all courses”.

The number of subjects you can study is limited to one per semester. U3A Banyule member participation is for courses offering face-to-face lectures, but at this stage not for on line or blended learning courses. (Note that specialist training may fall under the blended learning category or practical categories and many business courses are now on-line). We ask you to select 2 or 3 course preferences as your first preference may be unavailable. Please state your availability on days and times or state that you are flexible with your availability,

All U3A Banyule applications obtained at (https://www.u3abanyule.org.au/other_learning_opportunities.html) or from U3A Banyule office are lodged together through our contact at the University. You will receive formal notification from La Trobe University confirming your enrolment close to the beginning of semester.

PLEASE NOTE - While enrolments in U3A courses can be processed electronically, enrolment to attend lectures at La Trobe University as audit students is a separate and manual process.

- For those who enrol online using MyU3A, information is automatically displayed as to whether the class is full and if there is a waiting list.

- Tutors and class members may decide to share their contact details for communication purposes.

Enrolling in and withdrawing from classes: There are limited vacancies in some classes but even when full, members are urged to still enrol, as vacancies occur throughout the year. If you do enrol and then find you are unable to attend a class, please ensure you withdraw online or at the office as soon as possible to allow someone on the waiting list to take your place.

When members enrol in an Enrol and Pay Excursion/Event, **Class Fees** will appear on their Member Status page in MyU3A. It will show an outstanding balance. **Once payment has been made, using the PayPal option (either the U3A Banyule PayPal account, member's own PayPal account, or credit card), a receipt number and date of payment will be indicated on the Member Status page and the balance will reduce to zero.**

Payment needs to be made for one excursion/event at a time, prior to enrolling in another excursion/event.

Note: when paying Class Fees online, you will see a request to "Initiate payment for fees for 2019 Membership" and "You are paying \$ (amount) for 2019 membership. We cannot change the wording at this stage – but continue with your payment, which will be applied to the relevant excursion/event. In the future, we hope to be able to match the wording to the actual payment being made.

Members can also pay in the office, using cash or cheque or by bank transfer (**remember to add a reference of your surname and course code**). However, you can only enrol in one excursion/event and pay for that one, before enrolling and paying in another one.
