To Joan Learmont, Valerie McPhee and Secretary Margaret Jack, thank you for scrutineering and collating the proxy votes. I am very pleased that a significant number of members lodged proxy votes. It was a happy task to announce that members unanimously supported freezing fees until 2025! It was also a happy task to report all the positives since the last AGM; especially the fact that we have exceeded the expectations of our Strategic Plan set in 2022.

I am grateful to all those who help to make U3A Banyule a dynamic organisation. The 268 members who responded to the recent satisfaction survey told us that 95% are either satisfied or very satisfied. Just think, everything we do is built on volunteering as volunteers are vital to the existence of U3A Banyule. Interestingly 58% have not volunteered in any way. Volunteering does not necessarily involve high-level commitment. Often it means being in a team to set up refreshments or helping by bringing something for afternoon tea.

The Office is another area for valued volunteering. This year we have updated manuals and training to support this vital work. After all the Office is our front of house. On another level, there are a range of support roles where those involved take on an area of responsibility towards good management. And of course, there is Committee of Management, which is

not an onerous commitment when everybody does their share. While not everyone wants to volunteer at that level, I ask you how could you contribute?

The Survey wasn't all about volunteering. It has provided us with a valuable 'snapshot' and I thank the 268 respondents as your 'voice' gives us valuable feedback, which we will use to help inform the Strategic Plan 2024–27. We thank all our members for their positivity and with your help, we will continue to provide wonderful classes, lectures, excursions and of course all those muchneeded opportunities to socialise.

Joan Learmont Is an outstanding contributor to lifelong learning for older adults. For 3 years, she was Course Coordinator and member of CoM. She became President for 2 action-packed years. Joan oversaw the move from the old rooms into ILCH. When the Covid pandemic hit, Joan was concerned about our members being isolated and disengaged. She worked with a small team to navigate the subsequent implementation of online classes. Joan has been a tireless initiator of social events that bring people together. Joan has initiated Lingering Lunches, International Evenings, Charity events and has created afternoon teas after lectures.

Heather Stephens As a Member of the Committee of Management, Heather has made a huge contribution in terms of time, energy and expertise to the U3A community. Significantly, in her role as MYU3A Coordinator, she oversees our network and she actively problem solves for members. Heather has initiated and managed the review and rewriting of all office manuals and materials as well as creating training sessions to support our Office Volunteers. She helped initiate the introduction of Trybooking. Heather also contributes to a range of other charities through the Bluegum Quilting Group and Zonta's Breast Care Cushion Program. 

Golf for fun



'Let there be light' – and then Aurora Australis appeared!

The appearance of Aurora Australis during the weekend of 10-12 May was perfectly timed to follow the talk by Dr Tim Davis about light on Wednesday 1 May.

Tim Davis is a popular visiting scientist to U3A Banyule and generously shares his expertise as an international physicist with the scientific and non-scientific. Tim is a fantastic science communicator and manages to allow those of us frozen by the idea of physics to relax and understand, while giving the physics fans up-to-date information and research findings.

Tim took us through the history of light research from the ancient Greeks in approximately 300 BC, the Islamic philosophers, and Europeans from 1500 AD.

We learnt about the properties of light and an explanation of electric and magnetic fields, electromagnetic waves, and their properties. This all came in handy to be able to understand what was happening when the Aurora Australia appeared – caused by the interaction between charged particles

and the Earth's magnetic field – causing us to see these beautiful lights.



Further we learnt how lenses work – useful to the photographer, glasses wearers, astronomers and those who work with eyes. We learnt about refraction, reflection, how light waves move and what happens when light waves strike interferences. We learnt about mirages and rainbows.

Tim finished with the Spectre of the Broken – eerie pictures of a figure moving through fog! And then explained that it was created by light scattering (diffraction) from small rain drops (fog).

After the talk members asked if Tim could repeat his 2023 talk about Quantum physics, as several people wanted it again, or had not been able to attend. So Tim will be back on Wednesday 6 November to repeat the Quantum physics talk. He is thrilled that his audience at U3A is always so engaged.

Beleura House Excursion 17 April 2024

Our U3A Excursions group took the opportunity to visit Beleura House in Mornington. On our arrival we were served tea and biscuits from silver teapots and then given a brief history of the property and the residents who had occupied it over the past 160 years.

The property today occupies only a fraction of the original acreage, however its gardens are extensive and host a range of themed areas, which surround the Joseph Reed-designed home. We are fortunate that the property was bequeathed to the people of Victoria by the most recent owner of the property, John Tallis. His desire was that the house be a museum, reflecting a way of life as he left it in 1966.





In order to see the entire property, we toured the garden before our delightfully prepared lunch and then viewed the house interior after lunch.

The volunteer guides were able to relate a range of stories about the history of the house and its residents

John Tallis was the son of George Tallis, an Irishman who had come to Australia as a 17-year-old and gained employment at J.C. Williamsons.

In years to come he was to take over the helm and make the company one of the biggest theatre companies in the world. Hoyts pictures and radio stations plus the Comedy and Regent theatres were later acquired.

A visit to this beautiful house is a most worthwhile venture and was thoroughly enjoyed by our U3A members who attended.


Once again, the Creative Knitting Group has done








Wine tasting
